Students work to spread word on tobacco dangers

WAYNE - Worldwide, tobacco kills one person every 6.4 seconds - that's 599 people every hour and 13,400 every day.

New Jersey REBEL - Reaching Everyone By Exposing Lies - is a group of teens who voluntarily dedicated themselves to educating middle and elementary school children and community members about the perils of tobacco. REBEL involves both high schools while REBEL II includes two of the district's three middle schools. The program is operated in conjunction with Passaic County and the Wayne Alliance and is sponsored by the PTO.

Twenty-five students at George Washington Middle School take part in REBEL II, giving up their spare time to help spread the word that smoking kills. The program begins in October and runs through the end of the school year in June. Advisors, Wayne Police

Det. Bill Jurewicz, the school resource officer and Donna Facciolla, a teacher at George Washington, act as mentors for the kids.

REBEL II members recently took part in the 11th annual "Kick Butts Day," a national day of awareness sponsored by the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids. It's a celebration of youth leadership and activism in the fight against tobacco use. Kids are collaborating in an effort to send two messages to get tobacco companies to stop targeting them with marketing and to ask elected leaders to step up and do more in the way of protecting them from tobacco.

"It's novel when kids out and educate their community and families," Jurewicz said.

Throughout the day, REBEL II members wore white T-shirts emblazoned with the logo "1,200 All Day, Everyday" in bright red ink as a way to draw attention to the number. They also hung eye-

WAYNE - The hostility mounts as the school board election draws

Contentious issues have recently sparked heated deliberation. As Wayne has always been a fervent district when it comes to its children, some say that sentiment is lacking in this year's school budget.

Board members recognize this and have been vocal about their concerns while others continue to strongly support the numbers affirming that the budget reflects the lowest increase in eight years.

"It's a strong budget that includes several programs starting with pre-k up to the high school level. It covers both the socio and academic needs with a small increase," said Wayne school board president Theresa Curreri.

The issue over the property on Berdan Avenue near Wayne Hills High School that the board wants to purchase for \$518,000 has caused much argument. Residents

want to purchase the property, the \$518,000 will not be cut out of taxes, rather it will be kept aside. The house could still be purchased however the board would have to start from scratch.

"A combo of other initiatives will be addressed for instance academic programs, athletics and teachers if the budget is voted down. That's where the cuts will come from and the public needs to know this," explained Curreri.

Superintendent Dr. Maria Nuccetelli, in a last ditch effort to promote the budget, reminds residents not to let the issues regarding the property overshadow the importance of the budget. Furthermore asserting that whether there are negative views revolving around the budget, that it's no different than any other year.

"I welcome healthy discussions about initiatives. Everyone wants to see the issues addressed and people are very passionate about it," Nuccetelli said

man Chris Vergano lashed out at the school board during a recent council meeting.

"I have always supported the school budget but not this one. When books are in dire need and buildings need repairs spending \$518,000 is utterly ridiculous, said Vergano. "I've been looking for a good reason to buy the house but haven't heard one vet.

Music class is hands-on, real world

WAYNE - Pop singer Richard Marx once sang, "It's never what but who it is you know. So easy to get stuck in all that California snow. Take a good look around and you'll find people tryin' to mess with your mind," in his 1987 hit, "Don't Mean Nothing.

Students in a William Paterson University public relations class are learning just that and more as they get a taste of the big time in a classroom-style setting.

The old school approach to teaching doesn't suit adjunct professor George Dassinger, who believes the hands-on tactic to be much more useful in his course Media Use in Music & Entertainment. Real world experience has proven to be a valuable commodity for his class.

"You guys are great," he told the class which sits in an informal roundtable manner. "I've had other classes that seemed to grasp what I'm up here preaching. But this class is different, you guys 'get'

The semester's assignment is to generate publicity for an unknown group called the Josh Dion Band starting from the ground floor. Dassinger, who owns public relations firm based in Montclair, has millions of secrets and shortcuts to navigate through the media world that he lovingly shares with the stu-

"I'm fascinated by how things work from behind the scenes and how good images are put forth. I believe in telling the truth and especially in the entertainment business. The truth always comes out," Dassinger told the class.

Back in January, the class of about eight students were introduced to their "client" (Josh Dion Band). The media campaign followed as did target media assignments both long range and immediate. Each student assumed numerous responsibilities for which they've accomplished outside the classroom. For the most part, students learn the importance

Josh Dion, the band's drummer, is joined with five friends and fellow jazz students from WPU including Dan Hindman on guitars; Pat Firth, piano and key-boards; Brian Killeen, on bass; Sarah Versprille, backing vocals; and Justin Wade, backing vocals.

Produced by Dion, the CD has a fresh, eclectic sound. Dion's funky voice - similar to Ace Young from this season's American Idol competition - is reminiscent to that of the Doobie Brothers' Patrick Simmons tied together with the sounds of Earth, Wind and Fire.



Local artist keeps brother's legacy alive

WAYNE - Barbara Hall, a Wayne resident and amateur photographer, hadn't planned to co-author a book with her brother, Jon C. Hall.

Six years ago, she was busy with her pharmaceutical consulting business and real estate holdings, and recovering from a brain tumor. But in 2000, when Jon suffered a debilitating stroke, Barbara devised a recovery process that eventually allowed her brother to relearn how to walk, talk, read and write again. As Jon, a real estate lawyer and archaeology enthusiast, regained his strength, he also fulfilled a lifelong dream of writing. Barbara collaborated on a variety of literary projects with Jon, including her

brother's first novel, an archaeological mystery called "Bokuru." Jon wrote three more books before dying of heart disease in 2005. "Bokuru" was published posthumously in 2005, and since then, Barbara Hall has been sharing her brother's story and books with the

"Bokuru" tells the story of an eminent paleo-archaeologist who dies mysteriously while on an African dig. His daughter and a lawyer representing the museum that financed the archaeologist's work set out to determine what really happened in the remote setting. His daughter and virtually everyone who knew the doctor

and his work dispute the initial report of suicide as cause of death. As the complex story unfolds, the startling truth behind the doctor's death and excavation findings becomes more and more tantalizing, only revealed in the last few

While the story line is exciting enough, the extensive details and research infuse this mystery with a richness missing in many books of

catching posters at George Washington.

According to statistics, 1,200 people die nationwide every day from illnesses generated from smoking.

"Before the start of classes, kids were told to ask REBEL II members what 1,200 meant. We also told them that they would be very surprised to find out the answer. We feel it's important to reach kids when they're young," Facciolla stated.

Every puff is perilous.

A single cigarette exposes the body to more than 4,000 chemicals typically found in rat poison including arsenic and cyanide. Other deadly ingredients include ammonia, carbon monoxide, acetone, which is found in paint strippers, formaldehyde, used to preserve dead frogs, toluene, an industrial solvent and polonium-210, a highly radioactive element.

In New Jersey, 11,200 adults die annually from smoking. And 175,500 kids under 18 in New Jersey will ultimately die prematurely from smoking, according to www.tobaccofreekids.com.

This being said, the tobacco industry annually spends about \$15.4 billion on marketing ads, with an estimated \$314 million spent in New Jersey.

Upon learning such statistics, REBEL II members have a grasp of how dangerous smoking is. Both Jurewicz and Facciolla say they are fascinated by the amount of information the kids have ingested.

"I'm totally impressed by the kids' dedication. They really believe in the cause. Walking down the hallway, you can hear the REBEL II kids stating statistics and numbers to the other kids. It's also a way for the kids to have fun socially especially for the shyer children. It helps to bring them out of their shell," Facciolla said.

In addition, REBEL participants make visits to the elementary schools throughout the district to educate the younger children.

"Kids are encouraged to have fun and enjoy themselves. We're like a big family," Jurewicz stated. "On many occasions, we've had kids come to us saying they wanted to join REBEL II because we came to see them at their school and it looked fun."

For GW sixth grader Steven Lennon, joining REBEL II was more of a personal choice.

"You can make a big contribution to get kids and adults to stop smoking or to even start. My grandfather smoked and he died from it," Lennon said. Pointing to his T-shirt with 1,200 printed on it, he added, "See this number, I want this number to go down."

When asked in one word to describe smoking, Lennon replied, "terrible."

Julie Weiss, an eighth grader, said REBEL II is a fun way to help keep friends away from cigarettes.

"It's interesting to learn about tobacco so many people need to know how bad it really is," Weiss said

As for fellow classmate Marissa Merker, her choice to join was more health conscious.

"I'm allergic to the smoke from cigarettes so I'm all for trying to spread the word about it's dangers. And not to mention it smells awful. I just wish people would just stop smoking," Merker said. Both girls agreed that REBEL,

Both girls agreed that REBEL, as well as delivering a solid message about tobacco, also affords young kids the opportunity to stand up for their beliefs and not give into peer pressure.

"Being part of REBEL II isn't like viewed as being a nerdy thing

to do. Kids in our school (George Washington Middle School) think it's really cool," said Weiss.



Many candidates feel one of the biggest challenges is to provide the best education possible for students at a reasonable price to taxpayers.


Other challenges are dealing with minimal state aid, student transportation and special education costs and student safety.

Mumps outbreak shows vaccine's failings

There is a mumps epidemic sweeping across Middle America. It appears the outbreak started on the college campuses of Iowa and quickly spread to neighboring states. As of this writing, nearly 300 people have come down with this viral infection of the salivary glands. It is the biggest outbreak of mumps in decades and scientists are baffled. Almost 80 percent of the mumps-sufferers were vaccinated against the disease. Why are they getting it?

"We're trying to figure out why it's happening," said Iowa state epi-demiologist Dr. Patricia Quinlisk. "The vaccine certainly was made to cover this particular strain, because it's a fairly common strain of mumps. The vaccine is work-

She had me up until that last part. Clearly, the vaccine is NOT

wouldn't be an outbreak mumps. What we have here are members of the American medical community circling the wagons to defend the national vaccine program, even when something is

obviously amiss. This is a common stance among medical professionals (it must be taught on Day One of medical school) - defend the vaccine and immunization schedule set forth by the Centers for Disease Control and the American Academy of Pediatrics at all costs.

But you don't need an outbreak of mumps to see that the vaccine program in America is not effec-

working, or there tive. In some cases it's downright dangerous, full of unnecessary exposure to harmful chemicals, preservatives, and diseases. Kids are being vaccinated too young and too often. The vaccination schedule endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics is driven by the pharmaceutical companies which profit from these vaccines, not by public safety. Rather than investigate the safety of their products, the Big Pharm giants instead chose to lobby congress for protection from vaccine damage awsuits

> Since 1988 the mumps vaccine has been coupled with the measles and rubella (German measles) vaccines in a single shot called the

> The MMR shot is administered around one year of age and, coupled with a booster shot, is sup

posed to protect children from these diseases for the rest of their

Obviously, something's gone

In 1998, British scientist Dr. Andrew Wakefield published a report linking the MMR shot with the onset of autism and other developmental disorders in children. The medical community rebelled against Wakefield, and the report was later rescinded - most likely because British officials feared the bad press would cause parents to stop vaccinating their children, opening the door to an array of public health issues. Despite the fact that Wakefield's studies have been replicated in both the United States and abroad, the MMR shot continues to be a regular part of the American vaccination schedule.

I can tell you from personal experience that my son Rocco got the MMR shot shortly after his first birthday. He got the chicken pox vaccine the same day. He was never the same again. Shortly after receiving these shots he stopped talking and stopped pointing. He retreated into a solitary world of repetitive behaviors and sensory confusion. Six months later he was diagnosed with autism.

My son's story is not uncommon. There are thousands of parents who will tell you the same thing about the MMR vaccine and how it damaged their children. But, while the MMR's link to developmental disorders remains in question, the mumps outbreak in the Mid-West shows one thing for sure: the MMR vaccine doesn't work very well at protecting against mumps, either.

A flat budget would not be that bad

DEAR EDITOR:

The proposed 2006-2007 Wayne school budget makes the point that: "This year's increase to the education budget is the lowest in recent years," but we should all ask whether that is enough of a reason to make us approve it on April 18.

From the facts listed in the budget brochure sent out this week, total increases in the last four years have been 28 percent. In reality, because each successive increase is based on the previous budget, the entire school budget has increased by approximately 32 percent in the last four years. I only wish my salary had increased that much!

I would ask, "How much do the schools really need?" In a time when we all need to show fiscal responsibility, it should not be a given that the school board budget must increase every year.

When so many people are forced to live with minimal to no increases to their annual salaries, I would like to see the school board live within realistic means. I wonder how much the education of our children would suffer if the school budget remained flat for several years. I sincerely doubt that it would make much of a difference in the quality of their education. I ask all of you to think about this when you go out to vote on April 18.

Keep in mind the challenges of BOEs

DEAR EDITOR:

By now, New Jerseyans know about Gov. Corzine's proposed austerity budget for 2006-2007. The budget resulted from hard choices at the state level. At the local level, boards of education also faced difficult financial decisions as they prepared school budgets for the April 18 school election. Like it or not, the state's financial picture is a major part of the dynamic that determines what a community spends on its schools and the amount of money it must raise in property taxes.

This will mark the fifth consecutive year that the state's budget has either flat funded, or provided negligible increases in, aid to education. The five-year funding

freeze has occurred at the same time that school districts must serve an increasing number of students statewide and pay sharply escalating prices for necessities.

In this climate, school boards have directed limited resources to the classroom through increased efficiencies and shared-service arrangements. Today, more than 70 percent of New Jersey public school expenditures go toward classroom instruction and instructional support services, according to the U.S. Department of Education. Creating a school budget in this financial environment is no easy task. It involves balancing the community's education goals with the resources available from the state and from local property taxpayers. As citizens go the polls on April 18, I urge them to keep in mind the challenges facing their local board of education in determining the financial resources

necessary for the education of their community's children.







However, Briggs said many of his stops have been encouraging

This month, Passaic County will join others in the state to implement a new breath test called Alcotest, which will replace the current one which has been used nationwide since 1954. Briggs will over-see the implementation of the new test and handle its maintenance. The new alcohol test is more sensitive than the previous one and will provide results in about four minutes, according to Little Falls

Hunter said Little Falls' DWI arrest ace will play a key role in implementing the innovation.

"I can't see anyone being more qualified to oversee the new Alcotest than Briggs

According to the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety (DHTS), nationwide, alcohol-

related crashes account for approximately 40 percent of all traffic fatalities each year. In 2003, New Jersey accounted for 275 alcoholrelated fatalities. However, the last couple of years have been more encouraging.

"On a national level, fatalities in alcohol-related crashes have decreased for the second year," said Roberto Rodriguez, director of the DHTS. "In 2004, alcohol-related deaths accounted for dropped to 270 for New Jersey. We believe the figures for 2005 will show a continued decrease once we get final numbers back. The state has historically been several points below the national average.

Rodriguez attributes the tri-state public service campaign started in 2005 of "You drink and drive...you lose" of helping to further push the message and the crackdown has law enforcement using a zero tolerance approach, as with the Little Falls police department.

Rodriguez also said that majority of New Jersey residents support tougher enforcement and rank drunk driving ahead of healthcare, poverty, the environment and gun control as an important social issue, based on state-wide focus group data sampling.

glasses or bifocals were then needed for near vision.



"OTC decongestant nasal sprays quickly ease discomfort by shrinking nasal tissues and alleviating serious allergy symptoms," states

As spring arrives, many people Garay, a board-certified otolaryngologist, "but the use of such products comes with a serious medical

> A few squirts of pasal spray may not sound unsafe, but after three or four days of continuous OTC product use, nasal fissues can swell up again, creating a pattern of overuse and dependence for the user that may result in chronic nasal obstruction. Garay recommends that allergy sufferers consult with their physician before using OTC nasal sprays.

"Some nasal disorders are caused by structural irregularities in the nose, and no OTC product will help correct the fundamental problem," explains Garay. "Other

nasal and sinus conditions are more responsive to certain prescription medications that only a physician can order, following careful examination and diagno-

Garay asserts that because OTC products are not regulated to the same rigorous standards of prescription drugs, consumers mistak-enly assume that OTC products are harmless. He suggests that allergy sufferers seek the aid of a specialist to diagnose the specific problem, limit the use of OTC remedies to a few days, and read package warning labels carefully.





Historic Harlem church sings with 'Food for the Soul'

"Food for the Soul: Recipes and Stories from the Congregation of Harlem's Abyssinian Baptist Church." Introduction by the Rev. Dr. Calvin O. Butts, III, Pastor (One World/Ballantine, \$28).

Whether or not you are in a choir, there's a lot to sing about in the offerings found in "Food for the Soul: Recipes and Stories from the Congregation of Harlem's Abyssinian Baptist Church" (One World/Ballantine, \$28).

If this is truly food for the soul is a judgment best left to a higher power. What it certainly is, though, is food worthy of loosening your belt over, food that will bring smiles to the faces of you and your guests.

The menus, as well as the chuckles and tears caused by the endearing stories, come courtesy of the second oldest African-American church in the United States. The Abyssinian Baptist Church will celebrate its 200th anniversary in 2008.

This is one eclectic melting pot of both food and experiences, given that the church congregation includes worshippers from well beyond New York's borders, including Kenya, Jamaica, Ugan-da, Ghana, the Bahamas, Honduras, Panama, Egypt, South Africa, Grenada, Trinidad, Nige-ria, Brazil, Ireland, England, Hol-

land and Japan.
The stories and recipes come to life even more due to the captivating photographs of church members and their specialties.

As in the best of these types of books, the food itself tells stories. It includes gourmet favorites of young Harlem chefs who have hit it big with their first restaurants like Brian Washington Palmer, who contributes Native restaurant's Lamb Tagine Harlem-Style, which represents the French-Moroccan-Caribbean cuisine he created.

Also found inside is Booba's Saturday night special one-pot meal - a Spam, white flour, canned vegetable, evaporated milk and ketchup concoction from Eunice Newkirk, the youngest of 14 children, who still takes pride in this budget-stretching recipe of her mother.

There are other gourmet stunners, like salmon with amaretto sauce and escoveitched fish. There are more recipes from Palmer who, judging from his delicious showing here, could be next in line for his own cookbook - like

grilled sirloin with Dominican Creole sauce and pan-seared duck with parmesan risotto and orangetomatillo sauce.

Additional down-home treats include Justin Hay's five-alarm South Bronx Chili; Hattie Pennington's North Carolina-style ham hocks; Ma Eartha's meatloaf; Kevin McGruder's brown paper bag fried chicken; and Mama Georgia's Sweet Potato-Banana

The book delves into the rich history of the church's longtime food ministry, as well as how and why the African-American community should keep a watchful eye on good nutrition.

Mostly, though, it includes strong memories, like this one from Carole Darden Lloyd about her family favorite, chicken fricas-

see with drop dumplings:
"At one point while I was growing up we raised chickens in our backyard, so the recipe first included catching a chicken. It was considered a special treat if an egg was found in the cavity. We would (crack the egg) and add (it) to the pot just before dropping the dumplings.

As one reads memory after memory, it is quite easy to imagine chatting merrily at a church potluck with Lloyd, or members like Palmer, an adult transplant from California, or Hay, a member since his christening five decades ago. Their cookbook is certainly the next best thing.

LAMB TAGINE HARLEM-STYLE

8 lamb shanks

2 teaspoons fresh thyme

2 teaspoons fresh rosemary

2 tablespoons onion powder

2 tablespoons garlic powder

1 beef bouillon cube

1 (16-ounce) jar thick and chunky marinara sauce Cooked rice or couscous, for serving Olives, for garnish Orange slices, for garnish Blanched almonds, for garnish Yields 4 servings.

Place lamb shanks in large pot over medium heat and add water to cover, plus an additional 2 cups. Add thyme, rosemary, onion powder, garlic powder and beef bouillon cube. 2 large eggs, separated 1 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon ground allspice

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

3 medium sweet potatoes, cooked, peeled and mashed

1 cup heavy cream

1/2 cup (1 stick) unsaited butter, melted

1/4 cup mashed ripe banana 1 (9-inch) unbaked prepared or

homemade piecrust Yields 6 to 8 servings.

Preheat oven to 450 F.

Place egg yolks in large bowl of electric mixer and whip until thick. Reserve egg whites. Add sugar, cinnamon, allspice and nutmeg and mix until sugar is dissolved. Add sweet potatoes, cream and melted butter and mix well. Add banana and mix.

In separate bowl, beat egg whites until stiff peaks form. Fold egg whites into sweet potato mixture and pour into piecrust, Bake for 10 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 350 F and bake for 30 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

There are smart ways to save on homeowners insurance

New home: If your home is less than six years old, you may be entitled to a discount. Some insurers will slash eight to 15 percent off the premium.

When shopping for a home, keep in mind that companies consider various factors when evaluating a home's eligibility for a reduced rate. These may include the home's proximity to emergency services such as a fire hydrant or fire station, type of construction,

Companion policy: Insuring your home with the same company that insures your life or car may entitle you to a discount. Some companies reward customers by cutting the premium five to 15 per-

Protective device: Depending on the type, a fire or burglar alarm or sprinkler system installed in your home may generate a premium discount. Before purchasing an expensive system, check with your insurer; not all systems qualify for the discount. Then weigh the cost of an approved system against the expected savings on the premium.

Mature homeowner credit: Retirees age 55 or older may be eligible. Companies realize that retirees tend to stay close to home. As a result, homes are better maintained, and a potential loss, due to fire or burglary, could possibly be averted by a quick response. Some

companies reward seniors with as much as 10 percent off.

Secured community credit: Residing in a fully secured (entry protected on a 24 hour basis) or partially secured (card activated entry) community may be all you need to take advantage of this premium credit. Home improvements: Making improvements to your home, such as upgrading plumbing, replacing roofing, decreases the possibility of a loss and just might give you a greater return than you imagined, a reduced premium.

Lifestyle: With 23,000 smokingrelated fires a year, companies tend to reward nonsmokers with a two to five percent discount. Loyalty discount: In recognition of their customers' loyalty, some companies reduce premiums by five percent after three to five years and by 10 percent after six years or more.

Resist over-insuring. In the end,

it only inflates premium. The Better Busi-Bureau that suggests you determine how much your home and possessions are worth. Start by itemizing your possessions then have an agent help you esti-







"Rather it is a result of not knowing the right questions to ask and the proper steps to take. That's why we have provided the essential tools for anyone ready to leave leases and landlords behind or

Clearly, America agrees. Countless consumers have already found Tyson's and Brown's wisdom an integral component of their home buying experiences. Holistic, objective, and in plain English, their latest book covers everything from financing to credit scores to closing the deal. If you're undecided, it will even help you determine whether you're really ready to move out of Renterville.

Among other surprises, there is a brand new chapter devoted to the Internet's new role in real estate. "Home Buying for Dummies" walks you through the entire purchasing process, from browsing to buying, and outlines any possible scenario likely to occur. Read on to sample a few insights directly from the book.

Keep an eye out for a cosmet-

ic "fixer upper." A lazy seller may not even clean or repair their property for perspective buyers. So keep in mind that repainting, tearing up old carpet, replacing worn out appliances, and landscaping can be relatively cheap projects once you purchase. Just be sure you are realistic when assessing whether these defects can be corrected in a cost-efficient manner before you buy.

Look for the ones motivated to sell. It is easier to buy a home at or below fair market price if you find what is known as a motivated seller. Make your credit more credible. Most of us need a loan to purchase a house and a great credit report card can ensure that you get a loan with good (low) interest rates. Most credit lenders today consult a FICO (Fair Isaac Corporation) score to determine what risk a loan candidate carries. Therefore, it is necessary to keep good credit good and work to improve less than perfect credit before trying to buy.

A few ways to improve your FICO score: Pay your credit card bills and other monthly payments on time; don't open multiple credit accounts in a short period of time in an attempt to improve your score because rapid account buildup looks risky to loan officers; know that closing an existing account doesn't erase the account completely - it all remains in your history; do your rate shopping for a specific loan within a focused period of time. FICO scores distinguish between a search for a single loan and a search for many new credit lines, in part by the length of time over which inquiries occur.

Enter: Net. Tyson and Brown insist that newer technology is highly beneficial to the savvy prospective buyer and suggest that home shoppers take the initiative to do at least some of their research online. - Do your research and have a good idea of the fair market value for the home you're interested in and determine your own personal upper limit of cost.

- Especially with well-priced homes in popular areas, put yourself in the seller's position and remember that they have probably had several inquiries regarding their home already and will eventually choose the candidate with the best combination of price and terms of sale. Getting pre-approved for a mortgage offers the seller tremendous peace of mind that you're serious about

Carlike bikes: Two-wheelers range from ABS to air bags

Riding the sinewy road from Palm Springs, Calif., to the top of the Palms to Pines Highway, there was plenty of time to think ... To think about the new 6tar Stratoliner cruiser I was testing. To think Stratolounger would have been more accurate a name for this plush ride. To think about the fact motorcycles seem to be getting more carlike, with every new wave of models.

The Stratoliner, made by Yamaha, features an easy-shift-ing five-speed transmission with carlike ratios and a fuel-injected 1,854 cubic centimeter engine that is bigger than the power-plant in many automobiles. The notor generates 101 horsepower and 124 foot-pounds of torque both very carlike numbers.

It has a cushy new seat, a powerful radio, a catalytic emissions converter, etc. Whatever happened to kick-starters and chain drives?

The Stratoliner is the most carlike bike of any I've ridden. But it is hardly a showcase for automotive features. Other bikes have their own unique car-based attractions. Here is a list of some of the new or expanding uses of those features (this is by no means intended to be an exhausave list):

ANTI-LOCK BRAKES

BMW created a revolution in motorcycle braking in 1988 when it put ABS brakes on its K100RS. Since then, BMW has perfected the system and extended it to all the bikes in its lineup even offroad bikes (ABS can be switched off when wheel slip is

desired)

Honda Gold Wing touring bikes and Silver Wing scooters and some sports-touring models now offer ABS, as does Star on its sports-tourers (but not on the Stratoliner).

ABS is also available on sportbikes, including Ducati's ST4.

So far, Harley-Davidson has refused to offer ABS, although it did make the system available on its police bikes (and the systems were subsequently recalled).

The California Highway Patrol says ABS is a key reason its officers ride BMWs. "It's saved countless officers' lives," one patrolman told me.

SATELLITE RADIO

For 2006, Harley-Davidson began offering XM Satellite Radio as an option on its bigger bikes. The XM system works well in my test of it.

A small antenna is the only visible clue that the bike is XM- equipped. The satellite band is incorporated into the existing radio system.

The external speakers mounted in the fairings may be used, either while the bike is parked or on the road. Speaker sound was surprisingly audible even over the roar of our Ultra Classic.

The system, understandably, works a lot better with helmetrouted earphones; the regular intercom system integrates it all.

Several manufacturers already offer such amenities as six-disc CD changers and navigation systems.

AUTOMATIC TRANSMISSIONS

Honda experimented with automatic transmissions in the mid-1970s. They worked, but back then the average biker thought they were sissified, and without a lot of popular support for them, Honda soon stopped offering the automatic.

But now it has been con-

Automobiles

Firmed that it has been developing an automatic that might appear in production on some sport bikes later this year or next. Details about the system are scant, but reportedly it is airassisted.

Air-shifter systems have been developed for drag racers, in past years (they are illegal - but only if you get caught!).

A few years back, Honda

A few years back, Honda started offering reverse gear on its Gold Wing tourers, but it operates within a manual shifting system.

ADVANCED LIGHTING

Motorcycle lighting used to be a joke, although not a very funny one for those caught riding af night. But lighting overall has gone from flashlight-quality to as powerful as aircraft landing lights.

My favorite system is on the Honda ST1200 sport-tourer, which absolutely bathes the road ahead in pure white light; oncoming motorists must think the end is near.

Recent advances in motorcycle electrical systems have allowed the extra juice required by systems such as ABS, stereos and high-intensity lighting. HID lights, projector beams and LEDs have been appearing on more bikes, including the Stratoliner.

AIR BAGS

Yes, even air bags have come to motorcycling.

On the 2006 Gold Wing, Honda introduced the Motorcycle Airbag System, which includes the air bag and inflater; crash sensors, which monitor acceleration changes; and an ECU, which performs calculations to instantly determine when a collision is occurring.

When a severe frontal collision occurs, the four crash sensors mounted on the front fork measure the change in acceleration caused by the impact and convey this data to the ECU, which determines that a collision is occurring and whether or not it is necessary to inflate the bag.

Honda says the air bag can absorb some of the forward energy of the rider, reducing the velocity at which the rider may be thrown from the motorcycle and helping lessen the severity of injuries caused by hitting the pavement or another object.

HEATED SEATING, GRIPS

In Germany, where BMW enthusiasts ride no matter what the weather, it just made sense to offer heated seats on touring bikes.

BMW has since extended heated seating to other bikes in its lineup; most have heated hand grips as well - some offer it standard.

Honda and Yamaha, which also sell a lot of bikes in Europe, where they compete head to head with BMW, also started offering them. But only as options.

Air conditioning still comes standard on every motorcycle. Something that's worth having that's still free!

I thought of that as I rode from the 100-degree heat of California's Coachella Valley to the 60-degree summit of the nearby Anza Mountains on the Strato-
