Don't be afraid of the dark

Just call the Westfield-based 'Ghost Hunters' when things go bump

WESTFIELD — Do you have trouble with hauntings or apparitions? Has a portal to another universe opened in your home?

If these or any other form of psychic phenomena are occurring in your house and you feel the need for a paranormal investigation, then you will be happy to know that help is at hand: Ghosthunters are just a phone call away.

This service is not for laughs and it is not for those people who might actually need the services of a psychiatrist. If you are sane and serious and truly feel that something weird is going on in your house, then you should call Jeff and Laura Muller.

If you have a room in the house that cannot get warm no matter how high you turn up the heat, if a child or pet won't go into a room, if you were sure that you turned off the TV last night but it's on in the morning, then you might want to talk to the experts.

For years they have been working as a ghosthunting team with Mr. Muller, a radio technician by day, doing the investigation and Mrs. Muller, an office manager, taking notes. They do not charge for a consultation but will charge if further services are needed, such as researching a location or per-

son, arranging for a seance or securing the services of a shaman.

The Mullers have been married for 15 years and have two sons. The couple's interest in ghosthunting started about five years ago on Halloween when they were on a ghost tour. Talking afterward, they found out, to their surprise, that they had done a lot of reading on the subject and Mrs. Muller had done her high school senior thesis on the subject of the paranormal. They decided to open a part-time business looking for ghosts.

Although some of their investigations do not find proof of paranormal activity, often they do find evidence of it. Then being a ghosthunter can be anywhere from fun to scary.

"Ghosts are the fun things," Mrs. Muller said. "They can't hurt you. The biggest thing they could lift is a 5-pound bag of sugar."

"A ghost is on a different level of vibration than we are. These spirits vibrate quickly and must slow down to be seen — an apparition."

"Ghosts are often people who are dead and don't know it," she said, "and they go through the motions of their regular routine, which is why radios will be turned on or the heat is lowered."

"Sometimes they are the dead who are

afraid to go on the next level," Mrs. Muller said.

Generally benign, ghosts are sometimes missed by the people who were being haunted by it, but once the ghosthunters have coaxed it into "going into the light," it cannot be brought back.

"On the other hand, demonic spirits are scary," Mrs. Muller said. "They can hurt you."

Recently the Mullers were called to investigate unusual activity in Metuchen and it turned out to be an "elemental" — an inhuman spirit, an entity that exists at a low level of vibrations.

Because of its history as an Indian community and burial ground, Metuchen has a lot of spiritual activity. This is true with many locations that may have a traumatic or deeply spiritual past.

Next month Mr. and Mrs. Muller will attend a conference of the International Ghosthunters Society in Gettysburg, Pa. Because of the battle that took place there, Gettysburg is the site of major hauntings. The Learning Channel will be there taping the conference as part of a series on the battle.

Westfield club checkmates competition in team chess

Todd Lunna has won the Westfield Club Chess championship five time while Scott Massey has won the Westfield Club Chess Championship three times.

As of Jan. 8, Yaacov Norowitz was ranked 14th in the country in the 15-to16-year-old category. Tom Bartel, 15, was ranked 13th in the country in the 13-14-year-old category. Jerry Berkowitz has won the Somerset Chess Club Championship three times.

Historical luncheon considers mystery of 'Miller-Cory deed'

WESTFIELD — Town historian Homer J. Hall will discuss "Notes on the Miller-Cory Deed" at the First Wednesday Luncheon of the Westfield Historical Society April 1. This deed has been a puzzle since it was first discovered 25 years ago. Extensive research has revealed that its obvious errors and contradictions reflect the general state of confusion in Westfield at the end of the Revolutionary War.

When work on the Miller-Cory House was being organized in 1972, no records were available as to exactly who had built it or when and how it came to be transferred from the Miller family to the Corys. When the deed of purchase was discovered by "happy accident" it gave only the date of 1784, the seller as Jesse Miller representing the heirs of Samuel Miller, attested by Sabra Miller as the widow, Joseph Cory as the purchaser, and a description of the property.

This was good, new information but attempts to check it out ran into one blind alley after another. The property is described as "30 acres, more or less" but it measures out as 70-plus acres. It has 11 sides with only square right angle, and two different blaze trees at one corner. It is known that Joseph Cory was a double cousin but Jesse is not

mentioned in published records of the family, and no stones in the cemetery or dates of birth, marriage, or death have yet been found for Jesse, Sabra, or Samuel.

Probably explanations for most of this confusion can now be traced. This deed marked the end of an era. The property involved was part of the first West Fields Lot No. 55 settled in 1727 by William Miller. He died in 1782 leaving his oldest son Samuel as executor, but Samuel himself was so ill he only survived by two weeks. The 1784 deed covers only a remainder left after allowing for all past transfers. Most of the peculiarities noted in property lines can not be traced to changes in compass angles, and resulting open or latent disagreements between neighbors.

Dr. Hall first became concerned with Miller-Cory 50 years ago in Cranford. He and his wife Carrell discovered that her ancestor John Cory had built one of the oldest houses in town, about 1735. Family records identified it as being "in that part of Westfield

now Cranford." The old Cory house in Westfield now known as Miller-Cory was also said to be the oldest house in Westfield, but they were two different houses.

Untangling Cory family history led Dr. Hall to become a trustee and later president of the Cranford Historical Society, and in 1970 a charter member of the Union County Cultural and Heritage Board. In this capacity at the time Miller-Cory was being organized, he was able to help Betty Pate of Westfield get official approval for processing a batch of unidentified old deeds she had located in Union County records.

When the Miller-Cory deed turned up there by surprise, Dr. Hall arranged official permission for it to be turned over through Pate to Miller-Cory and the Westfield Historical Society, for permanent safe keeping. Since moving to Westfield nine years ago he has become a trustee of the local historical society and is currently on the Miller-Cory Board of Governors.

The April 1 luncheon will be

held, as usual, at noon at BG Fields on Springfield Avenue in Westfield. Members of the Historical Society will be contacted individually. Others may attend by calling Ed or Mary Orlando at 233-2930.

Improvements needed to rail line

New Jersey Department of Transportation Commissioner John Haley Jr. has declared 1998 the "Year of the Raritan Valley Line."

It's about time. For many years the Raritan Valley Line — the former Central Railroad of New Jersey — has not ranked high on the priority list of NJ Transit. Instead the state agency has concentrated on the Northeast Corridor Line and the Morris and Essex Line, which has received a tremendous boost with the beginning of direct service to New York's Penn Station.


However, despite NJ Transit's benign neglect, the Raritan Valley Line has thrived. Ridership on the line — which stretches from High Bridge in Hunterdon County through North Branch, Raritan, Somerville, Bound Brook, Dunellen, Westfield and Cranford — reached the highest volume in the last quarter of 1997 for the last 18 years. That number shows NJ Transit should begin a comprehensive program of investment and upgrades for the rail line.

Some of the ideas NJ Transit is studying are simple and do not require much investment. Those ideas include more ticket machines at stops along the lines and improving pedestrian and platform access at Newark Penn Station where Raritan Valley commuters have to connect with either PATH or the Northeast Corridor Line for the final leg of the journey to New York City. Already NJ Transit has completed station improvements in Westfield and more improvements are planned in North Branch, Raritan, Somerville, Bound Brook and Cranford.

But most importantly NJ Transit must begin work on giving Raritan Valley commuters direct service to New York's Penn Station. Anyone who has dealt with the hassle of changing trains in Newark knows that it is inconvenient, confusing and discouraging. As the unexpected success of the direct service on the Morris and Essex Line showed, ridership on the Raritan Valley Line will probably increase dramatically if a direct link to New York is established.

Commuters who use the Raritan Valley line should attend a public forum to discuss these proposals 7:30 p.m. Monday night in the third-floor meeting room of the Somerset County Administration Building, 20 Grove St., Somerville, NJ Transit needs to hear directly from those people who use the rail line about the need for investment, upgrades and the direct link to New York City.

With Somerset and Hunterdon counties experiencing explosive growth in the last decade, the need for more mass transit has become increasingly apparent. The demand clearly exists for improvements to the Raritan Valley Line; now it's up to NJ Transit to deliver the improvements.

Parents need to express opinions now

To The Record-Press:

After the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Board of Education meeting of March 12 it has come to my attention that space in the elementary schools is insufficient as of this date. Current plans have been proposed to free up classroom space in the elementary schools. This involves relocating a preschool kindergarten program (the children with speech and physical disabilities), a Title I program in kindergarten (kindergarten program) and a program for children with pervasive developmental delays to Park Middle School. Modular units are also to be installed at three of our elementary schools. These plans would provide our system with a total of 28 new classrooms for our children.

Given the projected enrollment figures for the next six years by the Board of Education and not taking into consideration the growing number of new low income housing developments in our area, this proposal is merely a Band-Aid on a major problem. As parents and taxpayers of Scotch Plains and Fanwood we are truly concerned with the relocation of our 3- and 4-year-old children into a quality school environment as well as the cost involved to convert usable school classrooms and buildings into temporary classrooms for preschool children. The overall cost of such relocations and modular

additions is rapidly increasing as is the turnover of the portable and temporary classroom. We feel that a better and more permanent solution exists that will create more space for our children without having to relocate our 3- and 4-year-olds to a middle school setting.

Currently, the Board of Education occupies a large area of Overgreen School which was once classroom space and was converted to offices for the Board of Education several years ago. Relocating the Board of Education and returning the space to its original state will create a total of eight to 10 classrooms and will be a more permanent solution as it would allow our children to remain in an elementary school setting environment as well as allow space for future elementary students as needed.

We are urging parents as well as future parents to get involved and voice your opinion. Otherwise your tax dollars will be obviously spent on the Board of Education continues to propose costly temporary solutions which will affect many children in the years to come.

Some folks just can't seem to get a break

Some are going to see this column as cop bashing. It is not!

I can't imagine why people, particularly those with family, would be willing to take on a career where their life is on the line every time they answer a domestic disturbance call, walk toward an unknown driver, or respond to a cry for help.

That kind of bravery, altruism, and selflessness is amazing and I salute all who take up the cause.

However! There is a policy about traffic violations that bothers me. In just this last month I've faced it twice and it brought to mind other times I wondered what it was about. The name and gender of whom I first speak shall remain unknown as discretion is the better part of valor!

Scene one: The driver is on a county road with field and forest on either side, not a car in front or behind. With no reference to determine speed, and in conversation with the passenger, the car certainly was going over the 5 mph speed limit as it came down the long hill. Sure enough, a police car pulled the driver over and the officer politely explained the sin committed. Evident because of the *mean* demeanor and apology of the officer, the officer said, after checking license and registration because there were no blue marks on the driver's record, would give the driver a break and mark the speeding as less than 15 mph over the limit (instead of the 18 it was), thereby saving points and money. The good driver got a break!

Scene two: The driver committed a sin and when pulled over said, "Yes, I'm guilty but with explanation." The officer listened patiently, took a long time detailing why the explanation was based on faulty reasoning/information. He checked out license and registration and finding no revocation points, said he would not mark the record if the driver understood the admonition to "go and drive more." The good driver got a break!

When my sons were young everyone one of them received tickets, mostly for speeding. Young new drivers are wonderful until they get their own driver's license a few times. But there was one time the 20-year-old was on his way to work at four in the afternoon just as a snowfall was beginning. But the time he had to begin miles down the road the conditions caused him to veer slightly at a curve, just enough for a woman coming in the other direction to hit his car.

The police came on the scene some minutes later and took time to ensure everyone was uninjured and to assess the damage. By the time all was done the car and sand trucks had driven through and the increasing hour traffic was having trouble getting on the road. Since it was clear the blame was on the driver, the officer let the punishment be such he wouldn't receive a ticket. His partner, however, being checked the young driver's record, said he already had several tickets, obviously on the habit of driving too fast. The good driver didn't get a break. And he really needed it. He would have been a better driver had he not received one.

So why is it, the no points ever gets a break when it comes to points — and increased one rates learning responsibility and continuing spending — never get a break many end up suspended because they have no means to get to a job in the urban world they live in. They take a chance driving around but it isn't really understandable.

People who hear about this situation should be grateful to have, and I am. To just shape the story with their own mind, when they see it.

Westfield students ahead of peers in math

To The Record-Press:

Last week, the Third International Mathematics and Science Study, the most comprehensive international study of education, placed United States 12th graders among the lowest of the 21 developed countries who took part in the study. Rather than wring our hands in despair, it is important that we consider what changes should be made to our schools so that our students will be more competitive in the international marketplace.

The TIMSS study showed great weakness nationwide in math beginning in the intermediate grades. The United States Department of Education has recommended steps that local schools should take to remedy these weaknesses, such as raising standards, ensuring that more students study algebra by the eighth grade and geometry by the ninth, improving teacher training, and encouraging more high school students to take demanding math and science courses such as physics and calculus.

Westfield began to move in this direction long before the TIMSS study was released. Last year, the Board of Education approved broad changes to the intermediate school math curriculum. Under the new curriculum, pre-algebra skills receive far more emphasis in the sixth grade. In the past, most students waited until ninth grade to begin study of algebra, with honors students beginning in eighth grade. Under the revised curriculum, most all of our students are

taking algebra as a two-year course during the seventh and eighth grade. Completing algebra by eighth grade will give these students the option to take more advanced mathematics in the high school.

It is natural that there will be some resistance to curriculum changes and some disagreements on how change should be implemented. It is important that the district be open to change so we are not left behind in a changing world, while recognizing that curriculum revision is not a one-step process; we will need to continue to assess the impact of the changes we've made and determine whether further adjustments are needed.

The achievement of Westfield students reflects the district's emphasis on improving curriculum and raising standards — not to mention the hard work of students, teachers and parents in meeting those standards. Roosevelt School's scores on the early warning test were the highest in the county last year, and Edison Intermediate School's scores showed the largest improvement in the county. Our Scholastic Aptitude Test scores continue to rise, and our students are accepted into the most competitive colleges.

These impressive results do not happen by accident. The Board of Education has been able to move forward with teacher training, investment in technology and more challenging textbooks, and limiting class size in the face of increasing enrollment because the voters of Westfield

have supported our budgets for the past three years.

The administration and board have worked hard to present a lean budget that allows us to continue to seek improvement in the already excellent Westfield schools. We take these decisions very seriously, knowing that the education we provide today will affect the opportunities of Westfield students for years to come, and that high quality schools are an essential part of every resident's property value. 

That day, the first day Joan Bonner was a telephone volunteer with Fanwood-based Contact We Care, was when she learned the true value of listening.

"I reflected back her guilt and sorrow," Mrs. Bonner said. "I let her know I heard what she was saying."

"The caller started out so upset. She couldn't talk to anyone. She felt they didn't understand her."

"By the end of the conversation she was thanking me," she said.

Mrs. Bonner continues to volunteer eight hours a month for Contact We Care and serves on the board of directors for the telephone line and crisis intervention service.

The former teacher, who has six children and 14 grandchildren, became a volunteer with the organization after her mother's death.

"I had been taking care of my mother following her stroke and had been totally out of from doing things in the community for more than two years," Mrs. Bonner said. "I was still actively teaching and wanted to volunteer in the community."

"I had heard Contact We Care's volunteer training would be beneficial to me as a teacher. The listening skills I learned really did work with the students!"

"Things might have been difficult at various times in my life," she said, "but we never wanted for the basics. I always had support from others and someone to talk to."

Mrs. Bonner was a volunteer at a nursing home before working with Contact We Care. She now is employed part-time at Knobshutten's Tea in Fanwood and was appointed to the borough's Historic Preservation Commission four years ago.

"Some of the people who call Contact We Care say they have no one to talk to," she said, "but often they are not alone. They may be living with family but they feel they can't talk to them."

What makes the organization's service so special is that callers find a confidential listener, Mrs. Bonner said.

Going with the flow

Despite loss of stars, Westfield boys still a threat

Change is inevitable in all sports. And it's something the Westfield High boys track and field squad has grown accustomed to in recent months.

Heading into the spring season, the Blue Devils realize they're not the same squad that won the Union County title and placed fourth in the North Jersey, Section 2 championships just one year ago.

At least not on paper. The most glaring omission on this year's squad is former distance standout Matt Elmuccio, who graduated last June after winning the Meet of Champions 3,200-meter race three consecutive years.

But the Blue Devils are used to life without Elmuccio and company, having already completed productive cross county and winter track campaigns since their departure.

The Blue Devils focus going into the spring is similar to their approach in the fall and winter.

"It's the same story. We're a whole new team with a whole new focus," said WHS boys track Head Coach John Martin. "We don't have the star quality like in recent years, but we're fairly well balanced with a good nucleus.

The guys have a lot of enthusiasm and we have a great coaching staff, who are very dedicated."

Westfield, which has 65 boys out for the team, opens its season with a dual meet against Cranford Wednesday at Kehler Stadium.

The Blue Devils best strength this season may be in the distance events. Junior Gordon Kaslusky is coming off a solid winter season and was a first team all-state selection last fall in cross country. Kaslusky will run in the 800, 1,600 and 3,200 races.

"Gordon did well this winter and had a great cross country season. Hopefully that gave him some good experience for the spring," said Martin.

Joining Kaslusky in the distance events are senior Bill Zacher, junior John Cognetti, senior captain Mark Matthews and classmate Pete Anzelone. Anzelone advanced to the Group 4 meet last season.

"The distance events are probably our strength, as well as the

pole vault, throws and hurdles," said Martin.

Senior captain Steve Dennis heads up the Blue Devil hurdlers, along with classmate Dave Geissler.

In the field events, senior captain Dave Citron, a Group 4 qualifier last spring, is back to handle the pole vault. Citron cleared a personal best 12-6 a year ago. Sophomore Josh Ray will also compete in the pole vault this season.

Expected to carry the Blue Devils in the discus and javelin are seniors Greg Gorski and Jason Krueger. Both will likely team up with each other in the relays.

"Our goal is to put together some decent relay teams," said Martin. "We'll also be trying to get some good individual performances this season."

The Cranford boys are coming off a solid winter season and the Blue Devils realize the Cougars will be a worthy foe in their season opener next week.

"They should be a pretty good test for us early on," said Martin.

Westfield doesn't meet rival Scotch Plains-Fanwood in a dual meet until May 5.

"Scotch Plains could be the team to beat in the county," said Martin. "They had a strong winter season that they hope will carry over into the spring."

The remainder of the Raider

The Raiders bring back only four starters from last year's squad in Gewirtz, Baumwell, senior catcher Jim Buccola and senior outfielder/designated hitter Delmar Patterson. Buccola, Gewirtz and Baumwell all hit over .300 in 1997.

"Those three guys will be the big key for us offensively," said Homm, whose team finished 11-7 a year ago and placed third

behind Cranford and Westfield in the Watchung Conference-National Division. "They all have some power. But hopefully some of the other players will step up at the plate for us."

Included in that bunch is the remainder of the Raiders' starting lineup, all of whom played junior varsity or freshmen ball last season.

Franzone will be the Raiders' Opening Day starter at first base, replacing the departed Kyle Atkins, senior Doug Bishop is at second, junior Ryan Habber, a catcher on JV a year ago, will handle third and Herman, who

spent last season on the freshman squad, starts in right field.

Vying to replace graduate John Luciano in center are Melendez and senior Donald Patterson.

Cerchio may start at short when Gewirtz pitches and junior Matt McCarthy is expected to see some reserve action in the infield.

"I think we're definitely talented enough to have a winning record," said Homm. "I think the kids coming up are decent ball players. I think they'll be fine once they get a few games under their belt."

Senior runner James Canterbury will now again head up the Raiders' distance team. The steady senior has advanced to the Meet of Champions since his freshman year.


Hoping to fill some of the void in the field events are sophomore Dan Loomis in the shot put and junior Scott Patterson in the shot put, discus and javelin.

Want to add a deck to your home? Plan ahead

Whether it's time to break out your swimsuit or your snowsuit, there's never a bad time to start thinking about a new deck for your home. Since a deck is a major addition, usually costing thousands of dollars, don't jump in without plan ahead.

To prevent moisture decay and other problems that may detract from the long-term beauty of your deck, the framing should be constructed from pressure-treated pine or the heartwood of a decay-resistant species, such as redwood or cedar.

Restored 240Z is a 4-wheel time machine

It took 27 years for me to appreciate the Datsun 240Z. I was a sophomore in high school when Datsun came out with this two-seat bullet car in 1970. Growing up in the Midwest, a Japanese sports car didn't make much of an impression on me or my peers who lusted after high-octane Detroit muscle.

The Z was foreign, but not a car you could forget. It looked fast sitting still, and the dry whine of the straight-six engine was a sexy signature.

Recently, I drove one of the restored 240Zs Nissan is selling as new, a Vintage Z. It was a blast from the past - *deja vu* all over again when I climbed in and started it up.

I was in a time machine to the early '70s. The radio was playing Bachman Turner Overdrive singing "You Ain't Seen Nothin' Yet." The slender wood steering wheel, the greenish glow of the instrument illumination and the spongy vinyl seats - all were reminders of typical '70s-grade equipment.

I've never wanted to go back to high school, yet somehow the memories were intriguing, like anticipating a Saturday night of cruising.

By today's standards the car is coarse, but back then it was state of the art.

It was a Japanese muscle car with a 150 hp, 2.4 liter inline 6 cylinder engine. It had a

sticker price of \$3,526, which was a few hundred dollars more than, say, a '70 Plymouth Road Runner V-8.

The Vintage Zs have been brought back to art status by Nissan, which is selling the restored cars for \$27,450 each at 10 dealerships through the Southwest to Southeast.

More dealer information is available by calling Nissan headquarters at (310) 771-6542. Ask for Pete Eyanow or Derek McKesson, who handle all the Z store issues (buying and selling of Z cars), or call 800-NISSAN-1.

Like the Corvette or Porsche Carrera, the 240Z made the brand a legend. It was built from 1970 to 1973, 123,472 were sold. The 240 evolved into the

260Z (2.6 liter engine) in 1974 to the 280ZX in 1979 and up to the 300ZX in 1984.

As the Z grew and evolved, it got more sophisticated, more powerful and more expensive to insure. America's love affair with trucks was blossoming at the time, too, which also helped kill off interest in pricey sports car and led Nissan to throw in the towel on the Z line in 1996.

By the end of its run in 1996, production had reached 1,103,843.

In getting rid of the Z, Nissan also got rid of a very marketable, iron-clad image as the Japanese brand for performance cars. It also abandoned family - a broad base of loyal owners.

Building these museum pieces is unique for a new car manufacturer and not something many would consider or need to consider. It's one way to help keep the Z car alive, said spokesman Scott Vazin, who has helped launch the program.

Only the 1970 to 1972 cars are restored, because the '73s had some cosmetic changes that would require Nissan to stock pile other parts.

The fourth and last generation 300ZX is being sold as a "Classic Z" and is put through a 120 point inspection and sold with extended warranty and special window decal. Classic Zs are sold at any dealership for current market value which is about \$28,000 for a fully re-

conditioned vehicle in excellent condition.

Building new-old cars hasn't been an easy start-up project, but the learning curve is beginning to smooth out, Vazin said. "Twenty-three cars have sold to date, and about three a month find homes."

Vintage Zs, like the original 240Zs, come with a 12-month/12,000-mile limited warranty and can be financed by Nissan.

What kind of person spends \$28,000 on a restored 240? "The buyers tend to be affluent who use it as a weekend car," Vazin said. "We're happy with that because they are actually driving them and not keeping them as a showpiece."

Even though the company just about breaks even with the asking price, it may expand the program to other models.

"There's definitely a pent up demand for 510 coupes and we've gotten a lot of calls for 260s and 280s," he said.

Is the Vintage Z program reaching any of its loyal audience? "We love it," said Dave Draper, a member of the Z Club of San Diego, Calif.

"I think it manifests an awareness on Nissan's part that they did something noteworthy in history, but it's not going to do a heck of a lot for the market," he said. "There is a tremendous number of people from the last couple decades who had a 240 or knew someone who did. The car is remembered widely and fondly."

The test car, which was the first of the restored Zs, was indeed pretty nice. It was quick, loud and a hoot to drive, but it's not for everyone.

A vintage 240Z isn't an appliance, it's a car for seat of the pants driving.

There is no traction control, no power steering, no ABS - and no emissions controls.

The brash, deep torque engine punches this rear drive two seater handily through gaps in traffic. It'll do 0-60 mph in less than nine seconds, Nissan said. The rear end squats down on hard acceleration, which at night keeps the headlight beams bouncing into the rearview mirror of the car in front of you.

Brakes, tires and gearbox are all less efficient than what is standard today on something as modest as a Dodge Neon, but the 240Z is quickly forgiven.

Only the best rust free examples have been bought for restoration, then everything is stripped off down to the shell, Vazin said. The engines and drivetrain are overhauled completely.

The cars are retrofitted with the factory upgrades that were made through 1972. That's the year you'd want if you went out to buy a 240, Vazin said. It came with an improved radiator, water pump and some driveline enhancements.

Benefits may accrue from FHA provision in budget

Many hundreds of families may benefit from a key home-ownership provision in the proposal fiscal 1999 budget for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, according to the Realtor Association.

HUD Secretary Andrew Cuomo is fully supported by the National Association of Realtors with this proposal to create new home-ownership opportunities through the Federal Housing Administration by raising the program's single family mortgage insurance limits.

HUD estimates that the proposal would enable approximately 3 million additional middle-class families - 600,000 families each year, to qualify for FHA-insured mortgages over the next five years.

According to the NAR, the proposal underscores the important role home-ownership plays in shaping the future of communities and the nation.

The plan would boost home-ownership in underserved markets among modest-income buyers, and would do so in a fiscally responsible manner.

FHA, a division of HUD, has historically served as an affordable alternative to conventional financing insured by private mortgage insurers, offering less stringent downpayment and loan qualifications requirements.

However, this program hasn't been usable in all markets, because the FHA mortgage insurance limit in certain areas hasn't kept pace with home price increases. The fiscal 1999 budget proposal would replace the current staggered mortgaged insurance limits - which range from \$86,317 to \$170,362 with a higher, single, nationwide limit that would match the maximum individual loan amount purchased in the secondary market by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. (This year, the Fannie Mae/Freddie Mac limit is \$227,150.)

This is the way to expand the reach of FHA and diversify its customer base. Adjusting the mortgage insurance limit would allow FHA to meet the needs of prospective buyers who don't qualify for conventional financing, but who would qualify for FHA financing if the program were accessible to them.






